

# Definitions

## obligation

/ɒbli'geɪʃ(ə)n/

*noun*

an act or course of action to which a person is morally or legally bound; a duty or commitment.

"I have an obligation to look after her"

*synonyms:* [duty](#), [commitment](#), [responsibility](#), moral imperative; [More](#)

- the condition of being morally or legally bound to do something.

"they are under no obligation to stick to the scheme"

- a debt of gratitude for a service or favour.

"she didn't want to be under an obligation to him"

*synonyms:* [contract](#), [agreement](#), [deed](#), [covenant](#), [bond](#), [treaty](#), [deal](#), [pact](#), [compact](#), [understanding](#), [transaction](#) [More](#)

# Definitions

## compulsion

/kəm'pʌlʃ(ə)n/ 

*noun*

1. the action or state of forcing or being forced to do something; constraint.

"the payment was made **under compulsion**"

*synonyms:* obligation, constraint, force, coercion, duress, pressure, pressurization, enforcement, oppression, intimidation; force majeure

"he had been under no compulsion to go"

2. an **irresistible urge** to behave in a certain way.

"he felt a compulsion to babble on about what had happened"

*synonyms:* urge, impulse, need, necessity, desire, longing, motivation, drive;

# Definitions

## impulse

/'impʌls/ 

*noun*

1. a sudden strong and unreflective urge or desire to act.

"I had an almost irresistible impulse to giggle"

*synonyms:* urge, instinct, drive, compulsion, need, itch; More

2. something that causes something to happen or happen more quickly; an impetus.

"an added impulse to this process of renewal"

*synonyms:* inspiration, stimulation, stimulus, incitement, motivation, encouragement, fillip, spur, prod, catalyst

"passions provide the main impulse of poetry and music"
